Jewish Care is the largest health and social care charity serving the UK Jewish community in London and the South East. Every single week we touch the lives of over 10,000 people through our vital services.

Jewish Care's vision is of a society where people support and care about one another and are able to participate fully in their community. Our mission is to enable Jewish people to do this, by delivering care and support that recognises and promotes Jewish values.

Respect for our clients' Jewish identity – regardless of the level or nature of their religious observance – is at the heart of all that we do. We offer help, advice and advocacy through a wide range of residential, day care and outreach services. These include care homes, community centres and care at home, as well as social work, support groups and a helpline.

We provide specialist services for older people, people with mental health needs, individuals with physical and sensory disabilities, Holocaust survivors, people who are living with dementia and for those who are caring for others.

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A message from our **President, Chairman and CEO**

It has been another positive year for Jewish Care, albeit in a period of continued challenge and, for Jewish Care, some significant change. Simon Morris announced he would be stepping down from the role of CEO in December 2017 and Daniel Carmel-Brown was appointed as his replacement. In the world of social care, change is constant and brings opportunity with it too. We have seen regulation across every area of our work become more challenging and, of note this year, was the work we undertook to prepare for the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

The state of funding for social care remains a key feature of public discourse, and, as always, costs continue to rise. Jewish Care has played an active role in discussions with both central and local government, seeking to ensure funding for care services is addressed as policy develops.

Everything we do continues to be underpinned by Jewish values and ethics and we continue to provide much-needed support to many thousands of people and their families. We are all, in the main, living longer. We all age in our own way and our needs are all different. That is why here at Jewish Care we continue to increase our range of services to meet the individual needs of everyone in the Jewish community.

We have progressed well with the development of our new Sandringham care and community campus to meet the growing needs of the local community in Hertfordshire and its surrounding areas. In addition, we have made significant progress with the construction of our new Independent Living scheme, Wohl Court in Hendon. Other significant developments include Brenner Community Centre, at Raine House relocating to Stepney Jewish Community Centre to create a thriving service for those that need it most. We have also continued to focus our



attention on recruiting staff to help us meet the national challenge that we and so many other care providers face when it comes to recruiting great front-line staff. This year we have created an award-winning recruitment website to attract the best in front-line staff.

Overall, the organisation is in an extremely strong position, with many more compliments, fewer complaints and the number of people using our services increasing.

All of these developments and the impact we've made, which you will read about in this annual review along with our aspirations for the year ahead, would simply not be possible without the generosity of our loyal supporters. They are all here for Jewish Care just as we are here for them, should they ever need us. In addition, we owe an enormous debt of gratitude to the thousands of wonderful volunteers who continue to support our fantastic workforce from 66 different nations – all here to serve one community – our community.

Promoting Wellbeing

What we achieved:


- ▲ We procured and began implementing a digital care planning tool called 'Nourish' across half of our care homes. This allowed our care staff to begin digitally recording the care and support needs of our residents in our care homes. It has also allowed us to build an accurate picture of how the day unfolds for our residents, this in turn allows us to be more sophisticated in planning the most personalised care possible for our residents with their relatives actively involved too.
- ▲ We strengthened our partnerships with North London Hospice and Macmillan to enable us to provide much-needed end-of-life support to individuals and their families across the community.
- ▲ We have made significant progress with the first phase of the development of Sandringham, our new care and community campus on the site of The Princess Alexandra Home. In Hendon our Independent Living Scheme, Wohl Court, now has windows, frames and bathrooms in place. There has been significant interest in both developments from across the community.

Future aims:

- ▲ We will open our new care home, Anita Dorfman House, at Sandringham along with our adjacent Wolfson Assisted Living studios. Residents from The Princess Alexandra Home will be the first to move into the new home in early 2019. We hope to ensure full occupancy of both the home and the assisted living studios soon after their opening.
- ▲ We will ensure full occupancy of Wohl Court, our new 32 Independent Living apartments in Hendon that will enable members of our community to live independently for as long as they can.
- ▲ We will improve our services by adopting appropriate digital technology. By the end of the year we will have electronic care plans in all of our care homes and the home care operational delivery will be fully automated on our new rostering system.

Strengthening Community

What we achieved:

- ▲ We have created an East London hub at the Brenner Centre at Stepney Jewish Community Centre, at Raine House. Following the closure of the Brenner Centre in Stamford Hill, we have invested in weekend and evening openings and an increased outreach programme resulting in increased usage by the older East End community and greater efficiencies.
- ▲ We continued to develop our partnership with World Jewish Relief providing specialist dementia training, conferences and mentoring for the Jewish community in Moldova, Belarus and Ukraine. Over our two visits, 350 people received training, support and mentoring in 'Living with Dementia' and 'Being Dementia Friendly' in their approach.
- ▲ Last year we invested in providing specialist training to over 400 of our amazing volunteers assisting them to continue to provide the excellent support they give to our clients, relatives and staff team. We couldn't do what we do without them.

Future aims:

- ▲ We will engage with our community to seek their views on ageing well and how Jewish Care can support them now and in the future. By 2019 we will have spoken in depth with the communities in North-West London, Redbridge, Herts and Southend to help us plan for the future.
- ▲ We will increase our outreach programmes including tea parties, Memory Matters cafés and conversation cafés, to help people build sustainable, local relationships and support networks for our community.
- ▲ We will increase our partnership work with local synagogues, supporting them to build capacity, so they can provide help for their members.

What we achieved:


- ▲ We launched our new online recruitment site 'doyouwish.org' and a new applicant tracking system. This has helped us significantly reduce the number of vacancies across our services. In addition, we have been awarded two Employer Brand Management Awards for Innovation and Best Not-for-Profit organisation.
- ▲ We carried out an extensive audit of all our organisational data processes and procedures with independent data consultants, which has resulted in a comprehensive implementation plan. This will not only meet Data Protection and GDPR regulations but will also ensure the safer protection of all our clients, supporters and volunteers data.
- ▲ We advised the Department of Health and Social Care about its digital strategy.

Future aims:

- ▲ We will continue to prioritise reducing our staff vacancies in our care homes and home care services by focusing on ongoing recruitment campaigns. We will continue to invest in the development of our current workforce. Our people are at the heart of all we do, enabling us to continue to offer excellent care.
- ▲ We will implement new data procedures and processes to further secure the use of personal information and to inform all of our clients, relatives, supporters and volunteers of a revised privacy notice in line with the latest Data Protection and GDPR regulations.
- ▲ We will recruit and develop a new senior Directorate leadership team following the appointment of the new CEO.





Our Bottom Line

Total charitable activities income for the Group before donations and other income was £31.4m (2016/17 £31.9m) and total charitable expenditure before depreciation and asset write-offs was £47.5m (2016/17 £46.5m) resulting in a net operating loss before donations and other income of £16.1m (2016/17 net loss of £14.6m).

Voluntary revenue donations were on a par with the prior year at £11.9m (2016/17 £11.7m) representing a sustained level of income in light of a more challenging environment.

Legacy income was down 14% on the prior year at £6.1m (2016/17 £7.1m). The volatility of this income stream year on year is supported by a legacy strategy to increase pledges and also to generate an internal awareness of the importance and impact of gifts in wills to Jewish Care's work, through the annual Legacy Awareness Week.

Capital project donations for our capital construction projects increased by 65% to £7.1m (2016/17 £4.3m). Capital donations received during the year were £5.7m towards the development of the Sandringham site at Stanmore with construction commencing in June 2017 (2016/17 £2.5m), as well as £1.4m for the Betty and Asher Loftus Centre completed in 2016.


Our Expenditure

Overall expenditure on charitable activities (including depreciation of £2.9m) for our Care Homes, Day Centres, Home Care, Independent Living and Mental Health resources was £50.4m (2016/17 £49.3m).

Charitable expenditure in our Care Homes was £33.5m (2016/17 £32.5m). The majority of the increases are linked directly to staffing costs with the national living wage impact (NLW) and Jewish Care's decision to pay above the NLW as at April 2017, the decision to harmonise pay rates for particular roles in care delivery to support recruitment and retention, additional recruitment costs across all services and agency usage with the increasing requirement for one-to-one care for our residents, all of which reflect sector-wide recruitment challenges. Upgrade works on our estate continue in line with our building condition review survey.

Charitable expenditure in our Day Centres was £7.1m (2016/17 £7.6m). 2017/18 saw the closure of the Brenner Centre in Stamford Hill because of a decline in demand and a re-provisioning of the services from a communal hub at our Day Centre in Stepney.

Charitable expenditure in our Independent Living service was £2.9m (2016/17 £2.7m).
